

Grateful Hearts and Growth






A visit from Fr. Patrick Conroy,SJ, Chaplain to the U.S. House of Representatives

Sam graduated last May from RIT and is now serving a year in Franciscan Volunteer Ministry in Silver Spring, Maryland. FVM is a group of lay men and women, living in community, who dedicate themselves to ministry in collaboration with the Franciscan Friars of the Holy Name Province. Their volunteer year is based on the Gospel message to express love in action. Newman at RIT first became acquainted with FVM at the St. Francis Inn in Philadelphia, the site of two week long service learning retreats Newman sponsored last year. We met and ministered with these engaging young men and women at the Inn and from that experience, Sam decided to find out more about a year of volunteer service before

pursuing a master's degree.

Sam is at a new site for FVM in Silver Spring. She lives in community with two other volunteers. The volunteers in their community serve at the St. Francis International School, teach ESL classes to immigrants and refugees at Langley Park and minister to active duty and veterans and their families at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Their days are varied and filled with many opportunities to see the face of God in everyday experiences.

I was able to visit Sam and her FVM community while they were on their fall retreat at Mt. Irenaeus in West Clarksville, NY. I was warmly welcomed into a vibrant community on what was a cold and rainy October night. We had a wonderful dinner and celebrated Mass together. After spending some time with Sam and her community members, I was quickly reminded of all the opportunities we have to learn in this lifetime. This year of volunteer service to others will give Sam and her community members a lifetime of memories as well as the tools to lead using compassionate service as the model.
