Hello everyone! I am Maggie Blaisdell, one of Newman's Tiger Stripes coordinators. First I want to take a moment to thank all of the Tiger Stripes volunteers for their hard work this year. I'd also like to thank the parents of our volunteers; a love of service comes from the nurturing of our faith by those we love! Here's a quick shout out to my parents for always encouraging service in my life.



We recently wrapped up our first "Operation Christmas Child" program. With the help of the Newman community, we were able to fill 30 shoeboxes with toys and essential items (like toothbrushes and pencils) for children in need. All of the items we packed in the boxes were donated by students and local residents. On packing day, everyone who participated also wrote a letter to the child whose box they packed. The shoeboxes have been shipped to the Operation Christmas Child national program headquarters, from which they will be dispersed throughout the globe! The Sisters of Saint Joseph also recently hosted a retreat for Newman students called "The Service Learning Retreat." As the Tiger Stripes coordinator, I often plan service outings, but my busy schedule means that I can't always attend them. However, I made this retreat a priority on my calendar - and I was not disappointed. The sisters were extremely welcoming; they opened up their home to us and it truly felt like a comfortable weekend with old friends, even though we just met. After dinner and a prayer service on the night of arrival, we played games late into the night. The next day, we were split into 3 groups of 3 and sent to different locations to complete volunteer work. My group painted the pantry floor and did housework for Bethany House, a Catholic worker women's shelter. Another group cooked and served a meal at the House of Mercy, serving the homeless community in Rochester. The final group volunteers at Morningstar, a foster care home fostering children with exceptional physical and/or emotional needs. When we returned, we had a nice discussion and activity learning about Catholic Social Teachings, and we reflected on our days as a group. Lastly, we played a hilarious game of "Scribblish" with the sisters before heading back to RIT. These two service activities are only a small sampling of what Tiger Stripes is about. Mark 10:45 sums up our mission clearly: "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and give his life as a ransom for many." Our lives are about much more than just ourselves - God did not put us here to live in a bubble. Tiger Stripes not only promotes opportunities that allow students to serve their neighbors in need, but also fosters service to others through relationships. I go to Newman when I feel down and out, when I need a shoulder to lean on - and I know this is true for many. We do not need to perform grand gestures to be in service to others.
