Divine Mercy Sunday is a fairly new feast on the church calendar. It was established in 2000 by Pope John Paul II when St. Faustina was canonized. St. Faustina, a poorly educated daughter of a humble Polish family, kept a 600 page diary of her encounters (apparitions) with Jesus. The entries in the diary focus on God's mercy, the call to accept God's mercy and to be merciful towards others as well as the need for conversion and the invitation to trust Jesus.

The celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday offers the chance to reflect on how God's mercy can truly transform our lives. Pope Francis is known as the "pope of mercy" and published a book titled, "The Name of God is Mercy." Each year, we have the opportunity to celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday as a way to ask for healing for our wounds and to offer the mercy of God to all who might be looking for forgiveness and reconciliation in relationships with others as well as with God.

Yes, mercy is ours! The feast we remember and celebrate this weekend is a reminder that there is absolutely nothing that any of us can do or have done that can not be forgiven by our loving and merciful God.
