A Journey of Faith and Persistence...

I had the pleasure to hear a story of inspiration by one of our students in the RCIA program. RCIA is the "Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults," a journey that adults take when they wish to be fully initiated in the Catholic Church. During our first class in September, we shared a bit about ourselves, our faith journey, and WHY we want to be a part of RCIA. It was a beautiful thing to be able to hear a wide range of experiences and stories, and to have insight into why our students have committed to becoming confirmed in the Catholic faith. One that stuck out to me in particular, was Mondi's story. Mondi and I met at another time so I could learn more about her journey, and she even graciously accepted the invitation to share her story in the Fall Newman Newsletter.

Mondi is an international student from Indonesia. She grew up with supportive parents, her dad being Catholic and her mom a Christian. Their native language is Bahasa. She learned the English language by watching movies in English with subtitles in Bahasa, and she read books in English to learn about the grammar and language use. Wow...what determination and ambition! During elementary school, Mondi attended a Catholic elementary school in Indonesia where she was able to participate in daily prayers, regularly scheduled Mass, and even sang in the church choir. She felt supported in her faith journey at this point.

Middle school was a much different experience, while attending the public school near her home. She struggled with being bullied in middle school because of her Catholic beliefs. She still attended mass, but didn't feel a sense of community and support. She only knew of one other Catholic in her middle school, and he, too, struggled with being bullied and mocked for his beliefs. It was a tough road, but it never distracted Mondi from her God and her Catholic faith. She shared that she "tried to be strong, forgiving like Jesus would be." High School was also a struggle, but in much differ-

ent ways. She was able to receive a great education, but with no chance to fully practice her faith. Ironically, this time of struggle in high school was when she felt closest to God. In the struggle and the loneliness,
