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Arms Wide Open



When out and about, I am often asked about the faith of young people. At times I hear phrases like, "the faith of young people is not like the faith of their parents and grand-

parents." Upon hearing a statement similar to this, I often smile and agree. I have discovered the faith of young adults does look very different from the faith of earlier generations. It is much more grounded in the gospel values of service and caring for

the least among us, without concern for differences. I have discovered young adults are hungry for rich experiences of prayer and opportunities that help them discover God in moments of quiet and contemplation. They look for engaging homilies that challenge them to value things that might rub against the values of our society. Young people are looking for mentors who also struggle to live the same values we so often speak about daily. Young adults look to us to nudge them gently towards the incarnation – God's presence in our midst.

I have a little rule for myself that I learned from someone a bit older and wiser. When a young person asks me to pray, serve others or simply hang out, I drop everything I am doing and join them immediately! Sometimes the invitations

aren't always clearly stated, and often disguised as something else, but upon further clarification and reflection, it suddenly becomes crystal clear. Yes, my plans for the day might suddenly change and I might not accomplish as much as I had intended, but the benefits!

As Holy Week began this year, I had the opportunity to quietly visit with Ibrahim, a young man who would celebrate Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. He simply smiled and said, "I am so excited!" Enthusiasm seeped from his pores. As he left me that afternoon, I was aware he energized me. I can still feel the energy and hope he has for his life and the world. A few days later as I watched him spontaneously kneel before the waters of Baptism, close his eyes and wait for the moment the water would be poured over his head,

Holy Week at RIT began like most: the weather flipping between 50 degrees and sunshine one day and snowflakes and wicked wind along the quarter mile the next, students in the midst of a busy week as the semester comes to a close, whispers of graduation and future plans over coffee in Java Wally's. Wednesday evening brought our last RCIA gathering as those preparing for Easter sacraments met in the Allen Chapel for a quick rehearsal and prayer before the Saturday evening Easter Vigil.



Throughout the year, Newman offers several retreats: Kairos, Busy Person Retreat, Intercollegiate Retreat at Mt. Irenaeus, An Evening Away at RIT, Service Learning Retreats and, this year, two new opportunities: An Afternoon with Francis and Clare and Senior Retreat. I am often humbled by the number of students that take several hours, a weekend or week to step away from the many demands on their lives to reflect, learn and grow with others through a retreat experience. The most recent service learning retreat to the St. Francis Inn in Philadelphia over Spring Break, offered a group of students the chance to challenge stereotypes and biases. We worked hard! I indeed find young people today living with Arms Wide Open — open to others, to possibilities and to the recognition of God — alive and well in our midst. May each of us learn from the young people we encounter each day. They have much to teach us!
