Perhaps you don't know that 90% of our budget comes from alumni and parents and less than \$600 from RIT, a reduction of over \$8,000 from before the pandemic. I am also very aware that the most important aspect of our work is the sacramental and pastoral care of students. Nothing will ever be greater and nothing will make our ministry more sustainable. To this and with you I am committed. This newsletter highlights those we serve and who, like you, know the importance of our Catholic faith. Every Tuesday night, a group of eight to twelve students meet in the Skalny room to share a meal, watch a video, and discuss life's biggest questions, including "What on earth am I here for?" This group at RIT Newman is one of many across the world participating in Alpha.

The Alpha Program was started in 1977 by an Anglican priest to start people on a deeper journey of faith and has since had millions of participants in nearly 170 countries.

Senior Maggie Blaisdell participated in Alpha through Newman during her freshman and sophomore years at RIT. Maggie describes Alpha as "the perfect space to learn and grow in faith, and make true, lasting relationships." While Alpha had to be canceled during the


